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Present Perfect Or Past Simple

We use the past simple for past events or actions which have no connection to the present. We use the present perfect for actions which started in the past and are still happening now OR for finished actions which have a connection to the present. We CAN'T use the present perfect with a finished time word: NOT: I've been to the museum yesterday. Simple Past vs. Present Perfect Simple - English Grammar

The simple past uses a single verb (the simple past form of the verb) while the present perfect uses two verbs (has/have + participle form of the verb). The easiest way to remember is that the action/event in past simple refers to "finished" time while in present perfect, it suggests there's still a connection to the present.

Present Perfect vs. Past Simple: Learn the Key Differences ...

The key distinction between present perfect and simple past is that present perfect is used to talk about past events that are relevant to the present. This could be for several reasons. The time period, either concrete or implied, that is being discussed is not finished. I have seen that guy three times today.

We use the present perfect with how long, for, since to talk about actions or situations that started in the past and still continue or are still true now. We use the past simple with how long, for, since to talk about actions or situations that started and finished in the past. Compare:

True Confessions - Simple Past vs. Present Perfect ...

Both Present Perfect and Past Simple are used to talk about a completed action. The difference is the following: Present Perfect denotes recent actions and events which are connected with the present. Past Simple denotes actions and events in finished time periods (last week, yesterday, at the weekend, etc.).

Past Simple or Present Perfect 1

The difference between the two tenses is that the simple past is for finished action and the present perfect is for unfinished actions or states or habits that started in the past and continue to the present. The present perfect of any verb is composed of two elements : the appropriate form of the auxiliary verb to have (present tense), plus the past participle of the main verb. The past participle of a regular verb is base+ed, e.g. played, arrived, looked. For irregular verbs, see the Table of irregular verbs in the section called 'Verbs'.
